Synopsis

Emergency departments (EDs) in Canada are being challenged by aging populations, decreasing community primary care options, and increased demand on emergency services. This has resulted in subpar ED metrics, overcrowding and extensive patient wait times.

In this concise, lively, back and forth session, we will present ED Flow pearls developed through humble, grassroots rural emergency practice in Newfoundland, Canada and have been implemented in ED's throughout the nation. In particular we will focus on ED patient flow strategies from a personal to departmental approach to effectively reduce wait times and enhance ED care.
